The course will examine how processes of political, economic and cultural globalization are connected to one another.						
		Students will work to gather information and data about a political actor, namely individuals and groups, focusing on their perceptions, attitudes and values, to understand their identity and behavior. Each student will make one class presentation, and students will write their own individual essays.						
		Projects will be explained at the beginning of the course, and students are to work with their assigned groups for class presentations and write their own individual essays.

		“American Political Institutions” will be an introduction to the study of the major themes and issues for understanding contemporary American politics while critically assessing the election, re-election and policies of the Obama administration.						

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		<p>The course will begin with a survey of American political culture beginning with its roots in the Protestant Reformation. The third week continues with a focus on American attitudes and American national ideals regarding the relationship of the individual to the American state. The fourth week focuses on the the relative weakness of the labor movement in the US in comparison with other industrialized democracies and its relationship to US national ideals. The fifth week continues focuses the role of the US Constitution in contemporary US political discourse. The sixth week focuses on the legacy of slavery and racism as the most important political “cleavage” issue defining American contemporary politics. The seventh week focuses on the function of American intellectuals in American political discourse from a comparative perspective. The eighth week is for midterm papers and meetings. The ninth week focuses on American political campaigns. The tenth week focuses on the American welfare state as a topic in American contemporary political discourse. The eleventh week focuses on the roles of religion in American contemporary political discourse. The thirteenth week focuses on American feminism as an example of a modern American social movement its impact on American politics and government. The fourteenth week focuses on contemporary American nationalism in international relations and its impact on American domestic politics.</p>

		<p>Introduction to International Relations will be an introduction to the major issues of international politics and the theoretical approaches which ground its analytical study. Course topics include the causes of cold and hot wars as well as their consequences. Other topics include international military intervention, nationalist political conflicts, and</p>						

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		<p>international multilateral legal organization with heavy emphasis on current examples of international cooperation and conflict. The conceptual framework of the course will begin with a brief history of the development of the academic field of international relations. The most influential theoretical perspective during the Cold War era was realism, and its most prominent exponent was Hans J. Morgenthau. The disintegration of the Cold War beginning in the 1960s saw a flourishing of alternative theoretical perspectives, emerging as critiques of classical realism. The course thereby introduces the student to neo-realism/structural realism, liberalism/idealism and constructivism as paradigms correcting what they see as the oversimplification of critical aspects of motivation for political behavior in realism, motivations which are no less true and essential for understanding world politics than realism's assumption of the primary motivation being the quest for power and influence for its own sake. The instructor presents a framework to relate the critiques of realism, neo-realism/structural realism, idealism/liberalism and constructivism, focusing on the political psychology of individual and group interpersonal interaction. It will emphasize the application of the insights of both political realism and its critiques for beginning to conceptualize peace strategies for resolving conflict in international relations now that the technology of war itself now threatens human civilization and perhaps the survival of the species since 1945.</p>

		<p>"European Politics and Society" is an introduction to the study of the major themes and issues for understanding the concept of Europeanization while comparatively surveying the national political systems of the member states of the European Union. Since the EU membership now stands at 28 members, selected countries are the focus of this course. In making EU policy, the member states remain key actors. Their role remains essential to comprehend EU governance and EU integration. The course will begin with a survey of the concept and process of Europeanization. It will then proceed to focus on the politics of the individual member states. The final section of the course then focuses on the overview impact of Europeanization on essential member state institutions for European social democracy.</p>

		This subject introduces global policy issues and provides fundamental knowledge on international cooperation to solve those issues. It covers various topics regarding international cooperation such as policy network, the role of international organizations and NGOs. The lecture consists of four main areas. First, it introduces global policy issues, particularly focusing on human rights/Democracy, education, environment, health, poverty and gender. Second, it introduces theories and history of international cooperation. Third, it discusses policy network among countries, NGO, and international organizations. Fourth, it introduces cases of international cooperation in Korea and projects that students can participate.

		This class will introduce some of the main developments in physics over the last hundred years. We will focus mainly on the theory of special relativity, and briefly introduce the fundamental ideas of quantum mechanics, particle physics and general relativity. These theories revolutionized the understanding of physics from the start of the twentieth century, and form the basis for most current physics research.						
30	Physics	열및통계물리학 2	Thermal and Statistical Physics2	01291	01	3/3	Tue6(), Thu5~6()	A 형(영)
		This class will use the theory of statistical mechanics introduced in the Thermal and Statistical Physics 1 (열및통계물리학 1) to look at a range of physical systems and phenomena. Topics will include: single particle statistics (the Maxwell-Boltzmann and Planck distributions), the behaviour of gases at low temperatures (in particular the different behaviour of Bosons and Fermions, Bose-Einstein condensation and the (nearly) free-electron gas model in conducting solids): the behaviour of systems with interactions (introducing the idea of quasiparticles through the study of vibrations in solids, and the general theory of phase transitions); and the behaviour of systems away from thermal equilibrium (including the heat equation, random walks and Brownian motion).
